Royal Greenwich Trust School

Welcome to the fourth edition of our project newsletter. We will keep you informed as to our plans and progress towards the delivery of Royal Greenwich Trust School.

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What has happened?

Ground works have progressed considerably since our previous newsletter. We have removed an existing substation compound, installed the new foul and underground drainage (area 1), completed electrical testing within the existing school premises, installed pile mat to piling area 2, reduced dig and crop piles and conducted pile static load testing as well as an integrity testing to all piles in area 1, inserted ground support beams to area 1.

It has been great to have a work experience student (an aspiring engineer) from Lewisham College spending a day with us last week. The visit went well and he's had an opportunity to gain insight from our engineers, surveyors and building managers. We look forward to the feedback and possible future visits.

What happens next?

Most of the July will consist of concrete works (3 no. of pours) in order to set the stage for the structural steel erection. The former is set to take approximately 7 weeks and the latter - around 5 weeks. At the end of July we will be commencing an installation of external stairs, hollow core flooring and netting; the duration of both is in the vicinity of 8 weeks.

Please, look out for our weekly concise progress reports displayed on our hoarding.

We are looking into delivering another presentation at Greenwich Trust school in June and July; particulars to be confirmed. In addition we expect and look forward to student site visits before the school breaks for summer holiday. More on this to feature in our next newsletter.
